# Deciphering the Dutch Factory Documents: New Perspectives on Early 17th Century Japan-Netherlands Relations

#### Overview

Since 2015, the International Research Center for Japanese Studies has been conducting joint research on documents related to the Dutch Factory in Hirado, held at the National Archives of the Netherlands in The Hague, in collaboration with the National Archives of the Netherlands and the Faculty of Humanities at Leiden University. To promote this collaborative research among the three institutions, an academic exchange agreement was signed on December 9, 2016. Based on this agreement, the International Research Center for Japanese Studies and the Faculty of Humanities at Leiden University have been receiving digital data of the documents from the National Archives of the Netherlands, and have been jointly working on their transcription, Japanese translation, and research analysis.

As a result of this research, in 2025, Leiden University and the International Research Center for Japanese Studies plan to publish the first volume of transcriptions and English summaries, and the first volume of Japanese translations, respectively. To mark this publication, an international symposium on the early history of Dutch-Japanese relations is being planned at the reconstructed Dutch Factory in Hirado City, Nagasaki Prefecture. The symposium aims to bring together researchers from both the Dutch and Japanese sides to present new perspectives on the nature of early Dutch-Japanese relations based on the contents of the documents included in this publication. The goal is to elucidate, from an international and interdisciplinary viewpoint, how these activities were specifically carried out.
